

"POTATO KING" KARR DIES UNEXPECTEDLY

Known Almond Farmer and Civil War Veteran at Life's End. Aged 93 Years.

Samuel S. Karr, 93 years old, widely known as the potato king of Almond and one of the last of Civil War veterans in that section, died unexpectedly Monday morning at the home of his son, I. D. Karr. Mr. Karr had been in failing health for some time but was active about the house. A long standing ailment culminated in his death when he arose for breakfast. He was born in the town of Almond near the farm on which he had lived since marriage. His pursuit of the farming occupation resulted in his establishment as one of the fore-

most farmers of the section in potato raising and also in the breeding of poultry and Ayrshire cattle. He was a member of the Almond Grange, 1102, belonged to the Presbyterian church and had served at one time as supervisor from the town of Almond. He was a member of Doty Post of the G. A. R., at Hornell, the nearest veterans post of the Civil War veterans and his war record was one of admiration and envy to both comrades of his days and veterans of later wars. He enlisted August 29, 1861 at Allegany, N. Y., at the outbreak of

Sept. 5, 1861 as corporal in Company D, 86th Regiment of New York Volunteer Infantry. In his three years of active duty as corporal in the regiment, he saw | service in every important battle of the Union army, was wounded, recovered, captured by Confederates,

He was captured near Cold Harbor and was sent to Libby prison. From Libby he was transferred to Andersonville: from there to Savannah, Mila, Blackshear and Thomasville. At the latter camp he made good an escape and joined his regiment again after eleven months and

18 days in prison. He was finally discharged June 18, 1865 near Washington, D. C., and returned to his native farm where he has since been regarded as an outstanding farmer, a reputable citizen and worker for the advancement of his occupation and allied in-
