Leap-Year Prerogative

Runs Through History
February, besides being the scapegoat month when it comes to adjusting man's record of time, is also blamed at times for leap-year customs. Even the matter of women's prerogative to propose marriage during leap year has been laid at February's door. But the charge scarcely holds water. The true source of the custom seems to be lost in antiquity, but nearly seventy years ago an English almanac quoted a law said to have been enacted in Scotland in 1228—perhaps it was in February—which said:

"Ordonat that during ye reign of her most blessed majesty, Margaret, like maiden lady, of bath high and low estate, shall have liberty to speak ye man she likes. Gif he refuses to tak hir to be his wyf, he shalle be mulct in the sum of an hundredry pundes, or less."

But while 1228 was leap year, there was no "blessed majesty, Margaret" at the time, for Alexander II, whose wife was Joanna, daughter of English King John, ruled Scotland from 1214 to 1249.

However, France once had such a law, and so did Genoa and Florence in the Fifteenth century. England, so far as is known, never had such a statute.

Storm Does Much Damage

Andover has been visited by two severe electrical storms this week. The first one Monday and again Wednesday afternoon. While the intense lightning and high wind storm caused considerable anxiety, no damage of any amount has been reported in this locality.

Whitesville and Hallport were hard hit Monday, damaging crops and property to quite some extent. At the farm of Harold Teater near Whitesville village, a large barn which had recently been repainted and repaired was burned to the ground.

A bolt struck the Hiram Parker barn near Hallport, stunning Mr. Parker and a dog. The barn was considerably damaged and Mr. Parker was rendered unconscious for an hour.

Barns on the farms of Grant Spicer and Clair Wilson in that vicinity were also struck by lightning, a horse being killed in the Wilson barn.

The highway departments met a heavy loss in the damage done to highways, miles of which had recently been put in fine shape at a considerable cost to the towns.
