None But Those Listed Can Legally Sell Beer Since June 15th in Allegany County. Under telegraphic instructions received from Chairman Mulroony of the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, the extension of time heretofore granted for the purpose of filing applications for permits to sell beer or wine expired Thursday, June 15th. On and after that date, without exception, no person, partnership, or corporation will be permitted to sell beer or wine in New York State unless he is in possession of a license duly issued by the State board, or has duly filed a legitimate application for a license with the county board having jurisdiction.
