Forty Years Ago

Alfred University

(Special to Andover News)

Alfred, N. Y.—With the 97th annual commencement program of last week completed, officials of Alfred University turned their attention today towards the annual summer session from July 3 to August 11.

Registrar Waldo A. Titsworth is director of the school.

Several students who failed to complete their prescribed university courses and others who need only to obtain one or two subjects for a degree have already registered for the summer school, as well as others accepted some weeks ago, it was said today by Director Titsworth.

Special courses in Ceramics, jewelry work, weaving and education and science, as well as regular college courses including foreign languages, mathematics, physics, chemistry and others will be offered. A faculty of 25 has been selected to teach the various subjects.

Thru the summer session it is possible for a student to complete an entire year's work of two semesters in a period of six weeks, three weeks being allowed for such semester's work. This is achieved by holding two class periods each day of the week, except on Saturday and Sunday. The class periods average an hour and a half each.

Indications are that Alfred University's registration next September will surpass the record-breaking total of 218 of last year, according to figures obtained from Registrar W. A. Titsworth this week. To date 32 students have been accepted as compared to a total of 15 accepted on the same day last year.

In addition to those students already accepted, the registrar pointed out that his office is holding more than 100 certificates of high school students asking for admittance and all awaiting the outcome of final examinations this June. Hundreds of catalogues have been requested and each day brings new letters for information.

Plans are under way for the second annual Freshman Camp of Alfred University, which will be held some time in September a few days before regular university sessions open. Bernard Alexander of Troy, N. J., is director of the camp.
