Red spiders, which are really red' mites, attack spruce, and when the ! " number of mites is large enough the / infested trees assume a brownishgray, unthrifty appearance; the leaves later turn grayish to brown in color and drop off when the infestation is severe. A close examination of the leaves may show the silken webbing of the mites and possibly the mites themselves.

Professor Glenn W. Herrick says that the mites may be kept in check, where water is available under pressure, by thoro and frequent wetting with the lawn hose. Care should be taken to direct the stream to the undersides as well as to the top of the leaves, with the full pressure of the water system.


