AVOID FOWL POX BY NEW VACCINE

Treatment is Advisable for Poultry
—Treat When Twelve to Sixteen Weeks Old.

Fowl pox of chickens is a disease that affects the poultryman's pocket-book, for infected birds lay few eggs and if the chicken's mouth and eyes are infected, the bird may die. When pullets recover from fowl pox, as many do they are immune from further attack. A new method of developing such immunity that can be used safely in most pullet flocks without serious disturbance, is now available to New York State poultrymen.

Vaccination is desirable where flocks had fowl pox last year; vaccination is probably not desirable if the flock has never suffered an attack of fowl pox; but to be certain to avoid the disease this fall and winter, vaccination is suggested as a preventive measure. The best time to vaccinate is when the pullets are between three and one-half and four months old. This is when the pullets are nearly mature but are not yet laying. It is advisable to vaccinate while the birds are still on range. Flocks that are affected with coccidiosis, worms or any other diseased condition will likely suffer some losses.

The vaccine is applied by first removing several feathers from the front part of one leg and then applying the vaccine with a small brush. Poultrymen should have instruction from a competent person who is familiar with the operation before he attempts the operation.

Some flocks show a lessened appetite for about a week after the vaccination, but they soon recover. About ten days after the flock is vaccinated, some of the birds should be examined to see if the vaccine is working. These birds should show a scab formation about the inoculated area. The scabs should be gone by four weeks and the birds should be considered recovered. However, it is not safe to sell birds for breeding purposes until about six weeks after the vaccination and then each bird should be examined carefully to see that no scabs remain. If birds that show scabs are sold into a flock that has not been vaccinated, serious outbreaks may occur.

The vaccine is distributed to New York State poultrymen this year on an experimental basis. Farm Bureau members may make application thru the county agricultural agent. Other poultrymen may have their local veterinarian make the application. A poultryman should state the number of birds he wishes to vaccinate, the date he plans to vaccinate, and the name of the veterinarian to whom the vaccine should be sent.

HOME BUREAU SHOW
WAYS TO ECONOMIZE
Exhibits at Syracuse State Fair Planned to Help the Householder Save Money.

Home Bureau exhibits at the State Fair at Syracuse Sept. 2 to 9, show ways to live satisfactorily on little cash, according to reports received at the state college of home economics at Cornell University. The exhibits are planned, the college says, to show how time, energy and ingenuity may be used to offset a lack of money.

The counties which exhibit are Broome, Cattaraugus, Chenango, Delaware, Franklin and Ontario. Each county has a booth in which Home Bureau members show methods and answer questions.

Cattaraugus county shows ways of saving on food, and emphasizes the use of home grown foods. Broome county Home Bureau exhibits re-styling clothes, under the direction of Mrs. Ann Phillips Duncan, home demonstration agent. Franklin county's subject is vegetable storage, and Eloise Irish, home demonstration agent, says a local committee plan shows how a family can store enough vegetables to last thru the eight unproductive months of the year. Chenango county tells how a home may be made comfortable and attractive if old, discarded furniture is rebuilt, and processes of reconditioning furniture will be shown.

Beatrice Fehr, home demonstration agent for Delaware county reports that the subject of its exhibit is refinishing of furniture and shows processes of refinishing for various types of woods as exemplified with early American pieces which have been brought out from the attics of Delaware county. Ontario county remodels hats, and displays made-over hats.
