Many apple and pear trees, at this time of the year, look as if the terminal shoots have been schorched with fire, but instead, they have been attacked by a bacteria-borne fulsease called fire blight. The bacteria have wintered in dead portions of trees blighted the previous year. When the sap begins to flow in the spring, the bacteria revive and gorge the tissues around the cankers and ooze to the surface in droplets containing millions of the bacteria. This is about the time the trees bloom, and the bacteria are spread by insects, wind and rain.

After the bacteria enter the flower they pass down through the stem, spur, and branch and even destroy the whole trees in one season; or they may destroy a single-branch and go no farther.
