When this is done, 20,000,000 people (assuming four to each wage earner's family) will suddenly be placed in position to the normal necessities of life. That means that the total trade volume of the nation will, upon the complete acceptance of this plan, be lifted by from 10 to 20 per cent.

Andover will have a definite share in this increased prosperity the extent that it participates in the plan, so there is a responsibility on every citizen here to co-operate to the utmost to make this gigantic national plan a complete success. Every employer and every consumer has a definite responsibility to assume.

THE EMPLOYER'S RESPONSIBILITY

N. R. A. calls upon every employer to shorten hours of labor, as to make room for more employees.

Each industry will before long adopt its own code which will fix the increased labor obligations to be assumed by all firms with that particular industry. Until that time all employers are asked to sign the President's Agreement and to meet the hours and wages established in that Agreement. This Agreement is sometimes ferred to as the Blanket Code.
