License for Coal Weighers

County Sealer of Weights and Measures, A. W. Corwin, reports some of the principal requirements of recent changes in the New York State coal law and regulations pertaining thereto, effective Oct. 1st, 1933, to be as follows:

Coal and coke shall be sold by weight. The weighing shall be done by a licensed weighmaster of the state of New York. This license is for the individual weighmaster and shall be kept at the place where the weighmaster is engaged in weighing. Coal and coke shall be weighed on sealed scales located in the State of New York. Each delivery must be accompanied by a weight ticket showing the weight of the coal, the name of the purchaser, the name of the seller and the signature of the licensed weighmaster. Such ticket shall be delivered to the purchaser.
