

## Alfred University

(Special to Andover News)

Alfred, Sept. 27.—"A University's Responsibility for International Understanding" will be the topic discussed by John Nelson, Montreal, president Rotary International, in the major address at the inauguration of Dr. Paul E. Tittsworth as President of Alfred University on October 20th at 10:30. Another feature will be the inaugural address by Dr. Tittsworth.

Mr. Nelson has had a wide and varied experience in both private and public work as publicist, author, organizer, publisher, traveler, editor, having served in all phases of newspaper work from reporter to managing editor. He is now third vice-president and supervisor of the department of Public Relations of the Sun Life Insurance Company, Montreal.

With a slightly smaller freshman registration but a larger enrollment of upperclassmen, the registration at Alfred University on Monday morning totaled 578, an increase of 38 over the total enrollment of last year.

Students are still registering this week so that a still larger increase will probably appear when the usual late registration is completed.

Freshman registration now totals 200 with a few accepted students still waiting to register, leaving a registration of 378 upperclassmen. On Friday evening of registration week in 1932 the total was 519; this year on the same date 540.

At present the Ceramic College registration has reached 279; the Liberal Arts College 294; the Theological Seminary, 3, making the total of 576. Late registration is likely to raise the total to approximately 600, exclusive of those registering in the State School of Agriculture which does not open for a few days.

The regular meeting of the Tri-County Mathematics Association, including practically Allegany, Livingston and Steuben counties, is scheduled for Sept. 30th. Dinner will be served at Hills Coffee Shop at 5 p. m., followed by a discussion of the re-organization of the Teaching of Elementary Mathematics.

Beginning his fifth year as director of religious activities at Alfred University, Chaplain James C. McLeod talked on "Repression vs. Suppression," pointing out the value of thorough knowledge in order properly to direct one's life choices and the opportunity which the college student has to gain such knowledge.

The first football game of the season, Defiance, Ohio vs. Alfred, is scheduled for Sept. 30th. Merrell Field, under the flood lights.

Some 40 men have been training under Coach Galloway to meet the team which Alfred beat in an opening contest last year.

Three games are scheduled for the home grid—Defiance, Sept. 30; Ithaca, Oct. 21; Coopers Union, Oct. 28. The game on Oct. 21st will be a double header, Hornell High school vs. Wellsville High School at 7 p. m. Varsity at 8. Incidentally this is the day set for the formal inauguration of Dr. Paul E. Tittsworth as President of Alfred University, making a full week-end of activities.
