Dairy Herd Improvement An example of what dairy herd dairymen is shown in the experience of Frank Stevens of Greenville

Stevens joined a dairy herd improvement association in April, 1932. At that time a test showed that each of his 14 cows produced an average! of 13.6 pounds of butterfat for the month. A year later, with one cow dry, the average April production of butterfat and 1.0001




