ANDOVER HIGH SCHOOL DEFEATS BOLIVAR HIGH

Fighting Line Holds Bolivar For Downs Twice Inside Three Yard Line in Opening Quarter.

With two powerful tackles, Brewster and Edwards, pounding through a crumbling Bolivar line, and breaking up the Bolivar interference time after time before the play had started, a fighting Andover High School line was able to hold Bolivar twice inside the purple's three yard line for downs, and then when Andover's backs ran roughshod during the entire last half over all opposition, advanced a step nearer the championship of Allegany county with its 6 to 0 victory.

Displaying the same defensive ability shown in last week's game against Allegany, plus a new offensive punch, the "fighting purple" of Andover, outweighed over ten pounds to the man, outplayed the Bolivar outfit in every department of the game, rolling up five first downs in one quarter, the third which led to the Andover touchdown.

Again it was "Male" Brundage, shifty halfback, who made the Andover score on one of the prettiest plays ever witnessed in Andover—a lateral pass, the same play which almost resulted in an Andover score last week, when Brundage got away for a forty yard jaunt, against Allegany High School.

Three first year men, "Johnnie Cannon," "Milt" Sweet, and "Joe" McAndrew playing in their first game showed up very well during that crucial first quarter, they having started the game. Because of this good showing they will probably see plenty of service in future games.

Andover kicked off to start the game and Bolivar advanced the ball in two plays to Andover's one yard line. Here the purple line turned back the assaults of the Bolivar warriors, and Brundage kicked out of danger. Bolivar failed to gain and kicked to Andover twenty three yard line. After Andover failed to pick up any distance Brundage passed, the ball being intercepted by Potter and advanced to the Andover nine yard stripe. Again the Andover line held, and Brundage again kicked out of danger, as the quarter ended.

During the second quarter play was mostly in mid-field, with Potter and Brundage staging a kicking duel, Brundage having a little the best of it. Neither team threatened at any time during this period.

Andover again kicked off to start the second half, and Bolivar failed to gain, punting to the Andover thirty yard line. At this point Andover opened a long drive down the field, advancing from their own thirty yard line to their opponent's two yard mark, but lacked the punch to put it over. Potter punted, but Clarke ran the ball back to the black and white's seventeen yard line before being downed, as the quarter ended.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, a lateral pass, Church to Brundage, was successful and Brundage scored with the winning points. During the remainder of the game the Andover backs continued to advance the ball almost at will and the game closed with the ball in their possession.

Great improvement was noticeable in the Andover offensive punch over that shown in last week's game. Coupled with its great defensive power, the "fighting purple" should put up a great battle against Wells-ville when the two teams meet a week from Saturday, a game that will decide the championship of Allegany County.

Andover fans are confident that with an improving offensive, Andover High School will defeat Wells-ville. This would mean the first county football championship ever to come to Andover.

Food Market Advice

After weeks when beef, lamb and young chicken have been the outstanding meat choices, smoked pork and hams will have a strong appeal. Ham is a year round favorite and it is hard to decide whether it is more popular hot or cold, boiled, baked, fried or broiled. Since it is the height of the sweet potato season and sweet potatoes seem to have a true affinity for ham it is a good time to serve them together.

Chicken fricassee with dumplings or a biscuit crust is another favorite for week-day or Sunday. Its flavor and color are different when the chicken is browned in hot fat before water is added so you can take your choice of a brown or a white fricassee. Mushrooms are again in market at reasonable prices and mushrooms help to make a chicken a la King all it should be.

Native vegetables are still in market but we are now coming into the season when they are gradually being supplemented by shipments from Southern and West Coast districts which specialize in growing vegetables on a larger scale. For example, bunched California carrots are very attractive but no more wholesome than native carrots.

Beets and eggplant are moderately plentiful. Cabbage and cauliflower are at their best with prices low. This is the time to enjoy cabbage as considerably higher prices are predicted due to crop conditions. Broccoli is becoming more plentiful. This vegetable needs to be carefully trimmed before cooking, retaining only the flower head and its stalk. The latter, unless very young and tender, should be peeled or scraped. Cook broccoli in plenty of boiling water. Like other members of the cabbage family it turns brown and strong when overcooked and the flower buds fall off.

Green peas and beans are nearly year round standbys, varying only in quality and price. California tomatoes are replacing native tomatoes but this vegetable is also in market all the year. More spinach of better quality is also coming into market with cooler weather.

Lettuce is again plentiful, inexpensive and of fine quality. If you have been cutting down on salads put them back on your menu. Check up on your list of salad dressings and serve hearts of lettuce with Russian or Thousand Island dress-

ing, peanut butter dressing, Roquefort dressing and French dressing with variations. A luncheon menu sure to please your family is suggested by the Quaker Maid Kitchen: Baked macaroni and cheese, hearts of lettuce with peanut butter dressing, apple sauce, gingersnaps and tea, with milk for children.

The peach and plum season is nearly over. Bartlett pears are being replaced by Bosc and Anjou pears. Concord grapes are very plentiful. Honeydew melons are still the best choice the Persian and casaba melons are coming in market. Cantaloupes are also still available.

The new crop of cranberries is being offered at the lowest price in 20 years. Stewed cranberries and cranberry cocktail are an interesting addition to fall menus.

Apples, both for eating and cooking, are available, such varieties as McIntosh, Jonathans, Delicious and Rome Beauties being offered. The McIntosh is an all purpose apple, Rome Beauties are usually baked and Jonathans and Delicious used for eating. Oranges and bananas are about as usual and there is a small supply of new crop grapefruit.
