Bath Veterans' Home Is Federal Property

A deed was received at the county clerk's office in Bath, October 14th which culminates the deal between the State of New York and the United States of America in regard to ownership of the soldiers' home at Bath.

The deed, sent from the attorney general's office conveys 345 acres of land, known as the estate of the Veteran Soldiers' Home from state to Federal governments, in accordance with laws of 1932, which provided the change of control, bringing the institution under the federal administration.
