### A. H. S. HAS OUTSCORED RIVALS FOR SEASON

Altho Only Winning Two Out of Four Contests, Purple Leads Opponents in Scoring. M. Brundage Leads in Individual Scoring.

Andover High School's "fighting purple," while they have won only two out of four games, have outscored their rivals by 18 points, running up 37 points in the four games while their opponents could only make 19. "Male" Brundage, A. H. S. star back has scored that many alone, while Church, Clarke and "Don" Brundage each have six points to their credit.

### ANDOVER SWAMPS

#### CUBA, 31 to 9

Experience Little Difficulty in Running up Score.—Large Number of First Men Used by Andover Coach

Andover High School's "fighting purple" experienced little difficulty in defeating Cuba High School on the local field last Friday afternoon by the score of 31-0.

After Andover scored twice in the first quarter, and once again in the second, coach "Wally" Clarke substituted almost an entire second team, which played Cuba on even terms, altho Cuba threatened the Andover goal line late in the second quarter.

Cuba showed a good offensive, making eight first downs, but in turn could not stop the long runs by the purple backs, and the Andover team crossed everything but the state line, running up 18 first downs and scored five touchdowns.

"Male" Brundage, Andover speed boy, again provided fans a thrill with an 85-yard run thru the entire Cuba team, after he had intercepted a Cuba pass in the early part of the fourth quarter. Brundage also scored in the early part of the second quarter on a trick line buck, which caught the Cuba defense unawares.

Andover kicked off to start the game and Cuba made two first downs in order before the Andover defense braced and Cuba was forced to punt to the Andover 20 yard line.

Two line bucks with "Don" Brundage and "Deke" Clarke totting the ball, failed to pick up over five yards and then "Male" Brundage raced 40 yards thru the Cuba line to the Cuba 38-yard line. "Connie" Church, on the next play, again broke thru the Cuba line and behind good interference scored the first touchdown of the game. The try for extra point failed.

Andover again kicked off and Cuba was again forced to punt. After Don Brundage gained 20 yards and Church picked up 12 more, Clarke swept around the Cuba right end for a touchdown, scoring from his 27-yard line. Again the try for point failed.

Andover kicked off and Cuba made another first down. Clarke made a good return of the Cuba punt and the purple began a march down the field with "Male" Brundage taking it over. Brundage drop kicked the extra point.

At this time Coach "Wally" Clark substituted almost an entire Andover team. Cuba began a march against the purple which ended on the four-yard line as the half ended.

Cuba kicked to start the last half and thru this entire period the teams played on even terms. Andover's varsity came back to register twice in the final period, one on M. Brundage's long run and again when Don Brundage scored from the three-yard line, making the final score 31-0.

In this game Andover flashed a real offense, but again did not do so well on the defense, altho the Andover line held when it had to do so. Cuba made almost as many first downs as Wellsville did a week before.

Joe McAndrew at left end looked good thruout the game, and "Male" Brundage, by virtue of several long runs was the backfield star.

Friday's game was one of the cleanest exhibitions of football ever witnessed on the local field, only one penalty being called on both teams, that on Andover for off-sides.

The fighting spirit with which Cuba went down to defeat was one of the day's highlights. Altho they knew they were beaten, the Cuba team fought with great courage.

#### GREENWOOD

Coach "Wally" Clark has developed an offensive punch that Andover has always lacked. That was proved in last week's game against Cuba. Clarke has four capable ball carriers in Church, Clarke, Don Brundage and "Male" Brundage and this quartet should make life miserable for Canisteo, Allegany and Portville, who are the three remaining teams on Andover's schedule.

"Male" Brundage's 85-yard run after he intercepted a Cuba pass last Friday is the second longest run ever made by an Andover player. Burt Seely, back in 1929 ran back a punt 109 yards to score against the Wellsville Junior Varsity. Andover lost that game too. It was in Brundage's first year out for football.

"Connie" Church, who is playing his fourth year of varsity football, scored his first touchdown Saturday on a pretty 35-yard run. Church has always been a good ball carrier, but has never put the ball over before. Don Brundage scored his first touchdown for Andover Saturday, too. It only took him four games.

It was very noticeable from the sidelines of the good sportsmanship of the Cuba boys in Friday's game. Some different than that Wellsville game when the orange and black were laying for several of the Andover boys—and got them too. Friday's game was the cleanest in football history in A. H. S.—only one penalty and that for an offside.

Big doings at Bolivar—Bolivar beat Canisteo recently 13-0, and that isn't all. According to reports they had a real scrap down there, and not football either. Cosches, players, officials, women spectators, all had a nice brawl after the game. We wonder who won? Nice people, what?

Andover should beat Canisteo Friday by about one touchdown, but will have to play consistent football to do it. Fenner has a good team, but we think that Andover will be on the long end of a 6-0 count. The Andover boys have won two games on their home field and have not as yet been scored upon. And after Friday they hope to have another feather in their cap.

Canisteo hasn't won a single game this year. But they have lost some tough ones, for instance—Canisteo 0, Hornell 6; Canisteo 0, Wellsville 7.

Boys' basketball will start in about a week, the definite date for the first practice as yet not having been set. Football men who play basketball will not work out until Nov. 20, after a week's lay-off.

"Charley" Huffcut will coach the Varsity this year and will be assisted by "Wally" Clarke, who will also help Miss McLoughlin with the girls' team.

The first game will be November 29, according to the schedule as it now shapes up. This is the earliest game to be scheduled for some time.
