## Alfred University

(Special to Andover News)

Alfred, N. Y.—More than 13 religious denominations are represented among the students of Alfred University with Methodists far in the lead with 151 adherents.

Other groupings represented are: Presbyterian with 81, Roman Catholic 80, Hebrew 62, First Day Baptist 58, Episcopal 44, Seventh Day Baptist 30, Congregational 28, Lutheran 18. Only nine students expressed no preference, the remaining ones being divided among other denominations in smaller groups.

Students at Alfred University are registered from eleven states, the District of Columbia, and Canada. New York State heads the list with 528 of the 600 students.

New Jersey is represented by 28, Pennsylvania by 5. Other states represented by smaller groups are: Georgia, Illinois, Maryland, Massachusetts, Ohio, Rhode Island, Virginia.

From the immediate vicinity of Alfred come 33 students, from Allegany county 106, Steuben 80, Cattaraugus 31, while Greater New York City sends 62.

Plans for the seventh annual meeting of the New York State Association of Deans, meeting at Albany, Nov. 3-4, are being completed.

Miss Sarah M. Sturtevant, education department, Teachers College, Columbia University, is president. Alfred University will be represented by Mrs. Dora K. Degen, dean of women.

Over 800 persons witnessed the formal inauguration of President Paul E. Titsworth at Alfred University, Friday, Oct. 20th. As his first official act following his installation he invested John Nelson of Montreal, president-Rotary International with the honorary degree, LL. D.

President Titsworth, in his inaugural address, "The Creative Teacher," showed that the creative teacher puts life and inspiration into his teaching, thinking of values to the student rather than subject matter only.

Mr. Nelson, in discussing "The University's Responsibility for International Relationships," enlarged upon the value of the university as teaching political science and international understanding.

### Forty Years Ago

An editorial in the News of 40 years ago says, in part: "Reports are in circulation that the supplies of petroleum in the United States are beginning to fail. For some time the Pennsylvania oil fields have fallen off in production and the older Ohio fields are giving out, while new discoveries do not by any means balance the losses."
