Alfred University

(Special to Andover News)

Alfred, Nov. 1.—Every individual manufacturer of ceramic ware in New York State is invited to send a representative to a convention at the New York State College of Ceramics, Alfred University, Alfred, on Nov. 9th, for the purpose of organizing a Ceramic Industries Association of New York State.

Dr. M. E. Holmes, dean of the Ceramic College, has been working for some time on plans for the meeting, and for the entertainment of those who attend. During the past summer he was able to visit a large percentage of the ceramic plants in the state for the purpose of making closer contacts between the industries and the college of Ceramics.

No formal program has been formed but in the forenoon will be a general meeting addressed by an expert on association work, followed by consideration of the actual organization of such an association and the election of officers.

Such associations have been functioning in several states, notably New Jersey, Ohio, Illinois, and Missouri, with much benefit to both industry and college. Such associations sponsor ceramic displays, group meetings and discussions of specific problems at their annual conventions.

Luncheon will be served at Social Hall, Alfred University, for all representatives. The afternoon will be open for group meetings, and for inspection of the new building which was completed recently by the state at a cost of more than \$175,000.

Visitors will be able to inspect the equipment, to see classes in operation, and to see the kind of work done. Dean Holmes expresses the hope that such an association will benefit the college by furnishing it with more concrete problems. The industries will be benefited by having placed at their disposal the research facilities of the college and by having students "equipped" for more definite problems in the industry.
