### ANDOVER DOWNS ALFRED IN OPENING GAME

Purple Wins Close Game in Extra Period—New Men Look Good.

Andover High School came thru in the extra period of the opening basketball game of the season to beat Coach "Tony" Perrone's men to the tune of 22-18, last Tuesday on the local floor.

Jimmie Cannon, star forward, went on a scoring rampage to keep the purple in the running and with less than a minute to go Paul Alderson sank a foul goal to tie the score 18 all as the game ended. In the extra period "Hot Shot" sank two pretty long shots to provide the winning points.

Eddie Brewster was a tower of strength for the Andover team, both on offense and defense. Especially was his work on the defensive outstanding, the big boy getting the ball from the backboard to his forwards time after time.

Another boy, starting his first game as a varsity member showed up very well. He was "Milt" Briggs whose work in bringing the ball into a scoring position was one of the highlights. Sly, another new man also looked promising in his first game.

Coach "Charlie" Huffcut has developed a team that was strong enough to trim one of the strongest teams in the Class C section of Allegany county. On the basis of last Tuesday's game, Andover should show up well in their section.

Andover scored first when Milt Briggs made a foul shot, but Dudley put Alfred in the lead with a pretty long shot. Then Jim Cannon took matters in hand, scoring half of his total points in the remaining minutes of the first quarter, while Alfred was held to only one more field goal, to give the purple an eight to four lead.

Tony Perrone substituted an entire team at the beginning of the second quarter and Alfred sank two field goals while Cannon was making only one point for Andover, but this was enough to maintain the Andover lead 9-8.

Andover increased their lead in the third quarter with a field goal by Brewster and two foul shots by Cannon, while Alfred was held scoreless, and Andover went into the final period with a five point lead.

During that fourth period, Coon, Alfred guard, made things miserable for the Andover outfit, scoring three field goals himself and was on the passing end of two by Dudley However, Cannon with two field goals kept Andover in the running with Alfred leading 18-17 with less than a minute to go.

It was then that Alderson was fouled but he missed, the ball rebounding to him, and was again fouled. Both of these shots he missed but again was fouled when the ball was tapped back to him. After again missing the first shot, he sank the final try thru the net for the tying point, as the game ended.

In the extra period Alderson provided the purple the winning points with two successive long shots from the middle of the floor, the game ending 22-18.

Coon, Alfred guard, was the outstanding man for his team, scoring six points himself and was in every play both on the defense and offense.

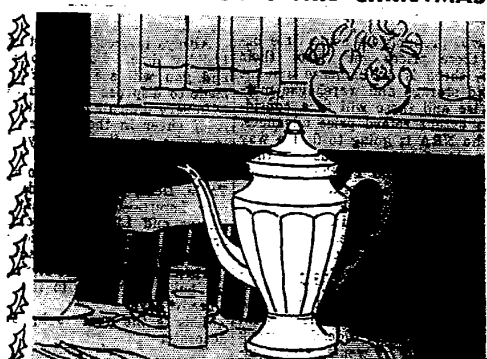
