Fire Destroys Farm Barns

Two large barns on the farm of George Cane, two miles east of Belmont were burned to the ground Saturday morning. The flames swept thru the barns, one 40 by 60 feet, the other 20 by 60, destroying them and ten milk cows, two horses, a bull, two heifers, a quantity of hay and a large silo.

The origin of the fire is unknown. Belmont firemen responded to the call and helped to save the house and a third large barn.

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
