ANDOVER LOSES TO WELLSVILLE

Andover Men Put up Good Fight—
Game Lost in Last Three Minutes.

After a fighting Andover High School team had battled Wellsville High School on equal terms for the first three quarters and part of the last, the black and orange came from behind in that fatal fourth period to take the first league game by the score of 17 to 15.

So close was the game that never did either team have a lead over two points, but Wellsville had this lead at the end. Andover led at half time 6-5, and also after the third period, 10-9.

Eddie Brewster and Milt Briggs were Andover's outstanding men, the big boy again proving himself Andover's most valuable man under the backboards. Briggs, altho not breaking into the scoring column, was the main cog in this purple's offense. McEnroe, who has the reputation of being Wellsville's big scorer, and is their captain, failed to score more than once.

McAndrew, Alderson and Cannon did their bit also, but did not show up as well as in last week's game, with the possible exception of McAndrew. Wellsville, however, is undoubtedly much stronger than Andover.

The first quarter featured tight guarding by both teams, neither one being able to score a field goal, but Wellsville scored three times from the foul line, and Andover twice. Dye, lanky Wellsville center, accounted for two of its team's points and McCarthy the other. Jim Cannon scored both points for Andover during this quarter.

Eddie Brewster, left alone under the Andover basket for a second, reached up and threw the first field goal of the game as the second quarter opened. A few minutes later Emery equalled the feat for his team. Alderson then sank a pretty long shot from the center of the floor as the half ended with Andover leading six to five.

During the third quarter both teams scored two field goals to still give Andover the lead, 10-9. Alderson made one of the Andover baskets with another long shot, and McAndrew, on a pretty cut, sank the other from under the basket. Peterson and Dye scored for Wellsville from under the basket.

Going into the last quarter with a one point lead, it looked as if Andover was going to keep it after four minutes had been played with both teams scoring four points. It was then that Coach Miles substituted Shine back in the game at forward, and on the next tip-off play, Shine missed an easy shot, but Peterson, following up, caged the hot to give his team the lead. Again on the next tip-off Shine dribbled down and caged the basket giving his team the game with the final score of 17-15.

Altho the purple lost the game, great improvement was noticed since last week's game with Alfred. Andover should put up a good fight with Cuba next Friday night.

Andover boys broke even in games during the last week, losing to Wellsville and winning from Almond. The Wellsville game was a tough one to lose, while the Almond game was a lopsided victory.

Miss Russ may have been the cause of losing the Wellsville game. One of the Andover boys took a long shot that looked as if it were going to be good, but the ball hit one of the wires, that have been erected in the gym to prevent echoes and fell wide.

Andover lost the Wellsville game on tip-off plays. Dye tipped it straight forward after the Andover guards had both cut down. However, Andover didn't show any weakness in the Almond game on tip-off plays.

Whitford was the entire Almond team. Brown, Almond guard, was about five feet tall. The girl's game was as rough as some football games. Albright was the official. Bill McEnroe, Wellsville captain, is plenty good.

A few more reasons why Andover didn't beat Wellsville: Andover men walked with the ball too much. Alderson took too many long shots in the first half and Cannon too many dizzy shots.

Brewster plays a better game at center than any of Andover's opponents thus far, as does Cannon play a better forward position than any on opposing teams.

Cuba's second team which plays the Andover frosh Friday night is in for a trimming. The frosh should win easily enough.

Cuba and Bolivar's second teams had some game last week. After playing the regular four periods without either team scoring, they played two extra periods with neither team still being able to score. It was then decided to play until one of the teams scored, and finally after they had played over four minutes a Bolivar man made a basket and Bolivar won 2-0.

"Peanuts Palmer is about the fastest girl forward we have seen." Vincent from Alfred, Palmer from Almond and Dean of Andover would make some forward combination.

Dexter, Cuba coach, has the reputation of being one of the best coaches in this section. He has had several championship teams in Class B. This year he has upheld his record by placing a strong contender in the field again, as shown by the close game with Bolivar his men played last week. Cuba lost 17-14, but Bolivar has one of the best teams in the county.

Friday's game with Cuba will be the first league game for Andover that counts toward the championship of Class B. Altho the Wellsville game was rated as a league game, Wellsville is a class A team and so the game does not count. This is true of Bolivar also. These towns are placed with Class B teams to provide them with a complete schedule for the season. So, if Andover wins Friday they will be at least in a tie for first place.

Jim Cannon leads the Andover scorers with 32 points, 12 of them have been on foul shots to lead in this department. He has had the most foul shots, 18, and has the best percentage, .667. He has also made the most field goals, 10. P. Alderson is next with seven. McAndrew has made the most personal fouls, five, and P. Alderson the least, one. Whitford has made the most points against Andover, 12.

Clarke's girls' team looked much better—Krugger looks good in scrimmage—Johnny Cannon looked good in practice Monday.

ANDOVER BOYS BEAT ALMOND

Have Little Difficulty in Beating Almond Men.—Large Number of Subs Used—Final Score 28 to 16.

Andover High School had little difficulty in beating Almond High School last Tuesday night on the Almond floor. The final score was 28 to 16.

Coach Huffcut substituted an entire second team at the beginning of the second half, and this team, too, completely outplayed the Almond men.

Jim Cannon, P. Alderson, Briggs, McAndrew and Brewster all played their usually good games, and in the last half Sly, Johnnie Cannon and Ed. Alderson looked good.

Jim Cannon opened the game with a foul shot, after the teams had played for several minutes with neither one getting even a shot. F. Whitford opened the scoring for Almond with a field goal on the next tip-off, to put his team in the lead for the only time during the game.

Alderson and Cannon then did all the remaining scoring to be done in the quarter, Andover leading 8-2.

In the second quarter, Jim Cannon, P. Alderson, Briggs and McAndrew contributed points to the already big lead, while Whitford was scoring three times from the field, and Andover led at half time 21-8.

Coach Huffcut substituted an entirely new team as the second half began, and in the third quarter Almond was held scoreless while Sly scored once from the field for Andover. Andover led at the end of the third quarter 23-8.

Jamison Herd Leads Again

With only seven herds averaging 25 pounds or more of butter fat, against eleven in October, the herd of 28 purebred Holsteins owned by L. H. Jamison, Ellmore, leads November records of the Allegany Dairy Herd Improvement Association. His 22 milking and six dry cows averaged 891 pounds milk and 33.2 pounds butter fat.

The 26-cow herd of N. B. Saunders & Son, Alfred, was next with an average of 29.7. Others in order: James Young, Angelica, 27.8; Milo Higgins, Canaseraga, 26.9; Raymond Strahan, Friendship, 26.3; C. R. Guilford, Cuba, 26.1; L. H. McCarty, Houghton, 25.2.

In the 27 dairies tested, 521 cows averaged 521 pounds of milk, 21.7 pounds of butterfat, average test, 4.05 per cent. One pound of grain was fed for every 3.1 pounds of milk.

What the tester says: When a group of dairymen talk about feeding calves and yearlings, a wide variety of opinions can be noted. Taking a consensus of them all, the men that grow the largest, best looking animals are the careful feeders who keep the animals growing from the beginning.

A calf should be kept clean and dry; so many times they are allowed to stay in a dark, damp place with insufficient bedding.

If a calf from good stock doesn't grow into a big, healthy cow, it is because she didn't get enough to eat when she needed it. Most of us have seen heifers come off from the pasture in the fall not much larger than when they were turned out.
