200 Men Work on CWA Projects

It was stated early this week by S. Taylor Brown, assistant federal disbursing officer for the Civic Works Administration, Allegany County district, with offices at Belmont, that 200 men had already been put to work on public projects of various kinds over the county, laborers drawing 50 cents per hour for 30 hours of work per week, with skilled mechanics paid \$1.20 per hour, rates ordered by Uncle Sam, who is footing the bill for the labor.

Some little misunderstandings have arisen over the multitude of details involved in the handling of payrolls for so many persons and the timekeeping necessary but these are being rapidly ironed out.

Two towns and one village have made application for grants and details have been forwarded to New York City, to the state administration.

The Town of New Hudson seeks the graveling and improvement of 2.1 miles of the dirt road from Black Creek northeasterly to the town line of Belfast, calling for a labor outlay of \$3,510 and a total cost of \$4,530, of which the town is ready to pay \$1,020.

The Town of Canadua has applied for federal help with graveling and grading two miles of the road along the east side of the Genesee river, calling for the payment of \$5,725 for labor and other outlays to total \$6,855. The Town to pay \$990.

The Village of Fillmore has applied for assistance involving a labor outlay of \$2,520 and other payments to total \$3,700 for draining, widening and grading Torpey, Emerald and Prospect streets, toward which it would furnish \$1,183.

The annual meeting of the Allegany County Farm and Home Bureau Associations will be held in Belmont, Tuesday, December 19. The two organizations meet separately in the forenoon, eat a free dinner at Ward Hall at noon, and unite for an afternoon session, to be addressed by good speakers on topics of agricultural interest.

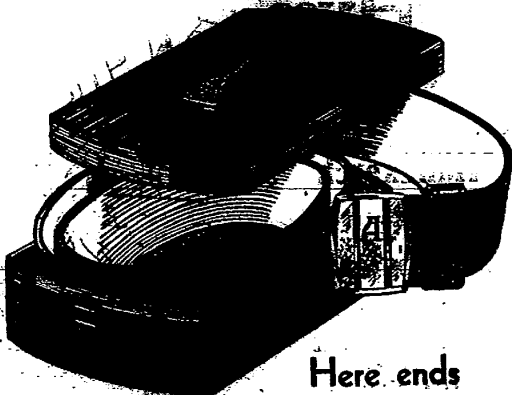
