ANDOVER DEFEATS ALMOND

Win in Extra Period When Cannon Sinks Foul Shot, Andover Shows Up Poorly.

After running up a 17-8 lead at the end of the first half, Almond High School came on with a strong finish, Tuesday night, Dec. 19th, to tie the game 25 all, and was only nosed out by one point in an extra period.

Andover, displaying a powerful offense ran up a nine-point lead at the half, and then Coach Huffcut substituted an entire team into the line-up which could only score four points while Almond was gathering in 11, to cut down the margin 19-21. Continuing with a strong offense against the Andover first team back in the fray, Almond tied the game 25-25 as the whistle ended.

In the extra period James Cannon made a foul shot to give Andover the victory, 26-25.

Andover looked far from good in the last half, while Almond seemed to be playing way over their heads. Jim Cannon and Brewster looked best for Andover and Briggs showed some ability in getting long passes thru the Almond zone defense.

Ransome Monroe

After an illness extending over a period of months, Ransome Monroe died Thursday afternoon, Dec. 14th at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Whitney of Grove street, aged 79 years.

Ransome Monroe was born at Alfred, N. Y., Dec. 19, 1854 and his entire life has been passed in this vicinity, most of it as a resident of Andover. He was the son of Joseph and Charity Campbell Monroe. He was married on Christmas Day in 1875 to Miss Adelia Gosper of Jasper, who died in October, 1922. Feb. 5, 1925 he was again married to Mrs. Hattie Whitney who survives.

Mr. Monroe is also survived by one son, John Monroe of Andover and two daughters, Mrs. Harry Hunter of Omaha, Neb., and Miss Celia Monroe of Erie, Pa.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the home, Rev. John McIntosh of the Baptist church officiating. Interment was in Hillside cemetery.

Will of Andover Man Admitted to Probate

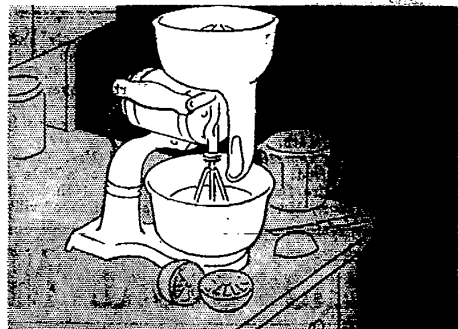
