Forty Years Ago

Mr. Beebe was taken ill Saturday previous with what was pronounced grippe. The disease affected his stomach and bowels and after two or three days he grew rapidly worse. Deceased was a son of Mr. and Mrs. N. L. Beebe and was born here 22 years ago on June 11th. He was married September 28th to Helen Brainard of this village. Mr. Beebe was the junior member of the firm of Beebe, Williams & Co., and also manager of the Western Union and Postal Telegraph companies' offices. Funeral services were held at the M. E. church Monday.
