

Jansen New Paltz, New York.

Immediate Success Mr. Jansen still lives on the old farm, operating the same orchard of 350 original McIntosh apple trees. He tells how in 1896 he purchased three McIntosh trees from a Geneva nursery. His first shipment of McIntosh apples, six bar-1900. They were received with such enthusiasm by the retailers and




