## To Plant 100,000 Trees in 1934

The New York State Conservation Department has announced, thru County Club Agent Lou L. Burton, that free trees are again available for distribution to boys and girls in New York State. This continues a policy established in 1928. Since that time 6,822,000 trees have been planted on waste areas by boys and girls who have enrolled as 4-H Club members.

Allegany county club members are proud of their record of planting 349,000 trees during the last two years, having led all other counties in the state during this period, and setting an all-time record of 189,000 in 1933.

All orders for free trees this year must be filed by February 1st, 1934, thru the county club agent at the Farm Bureau Office, Belmont. Six species are available: White spruce, Norway spruce, Balsam, Red Pine, Scotch Pine and white cedar. Information concerning the use of these trees is contained on the application forms. Allegany county members will endeavor to secure orders for 100,000 or more trees this year.

Special awards and trips are offered to boys and girls establishing the best plantations of 1,000 or more trees.
