Bolivar's zone defense is the best we have seen this season. Canisteo also has a good zone defense, but the Bolivar bunch is better. Even on the huge floor at Bolivar, the purple could not advance through it, and had to resort to long shots to score.

Andover only used two men in that defense, however, one in each corner, whereas against Canisteo, three men were placed in it, the two men in the corners and another on the foul line with two men working the ball down. With this added offensive strength the purple scored most of their field goals from under the basket.

The girls' games with Bolivar and Canisteo were regular football games. It seems that every school in Allegany county has different girls' rules. Whenever a team plays another, one of the two must play under different regulations than they are accustomed to. That was the fix Andover found itself in at Bolivar.

It seems that it would be possible for every school in the county to adopt the same rules, and another year authorities from this school will try to have this done. A good suggestion on what rules to use—"Why not use regulation girls' basketball rules?"

Remember that protest with Whitesville last year? The rules governing the time outs have not been changed this year. Several news writers of this section last year commented on the Andover protest, and said that the rule should be changed so that a field goal made when the ball is in play immediately following a time out by the opposing team should be counted. No action has been taken, however, and there probably never will be.

We are picking Bolivar to win Class A this year after last Friday night's showing against the purple. Cheski, a former Hornell High School player, will be eligible after January. Cheski is a natural and starred with Hornell for two seasons. Wellsville may have DeBarber back, but he cannot equal Cheski.

Cuba or Friendship should win Class B and Angelica Class C. Alfred has put up the best showing of any of the teams from this part of the county, but is way down in the standings. Almond and Whitesville are having a fight for last place. We pick Whitesville for that doubtful honor.

We were talking to Tony Ferrone from Alfred, who is coaching that team. "Tony" did not seem to be very enthused over his boys' team, but spoke of his girls' team in glowing terms. And well he might, for Alfred has one of the best, if not the best, girls' teams in the county. We should like to see them meet Bolivar.

[Not that we expect to see Fillmore beat Andover. On the contrary, Andover should win by five points. However, Fillmore has the reputation of being a hard place to win at, and Andover might lose this game. It seems hard to believe that Andover can beat Cuba away or Friendship.

The frosh should win without any trouble. The next home game will be with Friendship here a week from this Friday. A tough game there. Our eighth grade team will soon be in action. BOLIVAR BEATS ANDOVER

Have Little Difficulty in Trimming Purple—Potter and Wood Stand Out for Blue and White.

Bolivar High School had little difficulty in beating the purple of Andover on their home court last Friday night, to the tune of 26-14.

The first half was a rout, Bolivar scoring 15 of their total points during this period, and at the same time held the purple to two points, both scored by Cannon from the foul line.

Brewster of Andover was ejected from the game early in the fourth quarter to stop a rally started by the Andover team, but the purple still outscored Bolivar in the last half. However, the lead was too great, and the game ended with Bolivar leading 26-14.

Altho this was rated as a league game, it does not count in the final standings of teams in Class B, of which Andover is a member. Bolivar is a Class A team, and thus Andover was left with exactly the same rating as they had before, one loss and no wins.

Andover could not seem to be able to get started in the first half, but played on equal terms with their more experienced opponents on the huge Bolivar floor during the last half.

Guild handled the game well on the large floor, his refereeing being the best of any of the league officials.

Potter and Wood were outstanding for Bolivar, the latter scoring 12 points and playing an outstanding floor game. Bolivar presented a zone defense that was impossible to break thru, and most of Andover's field goals came from long shots.

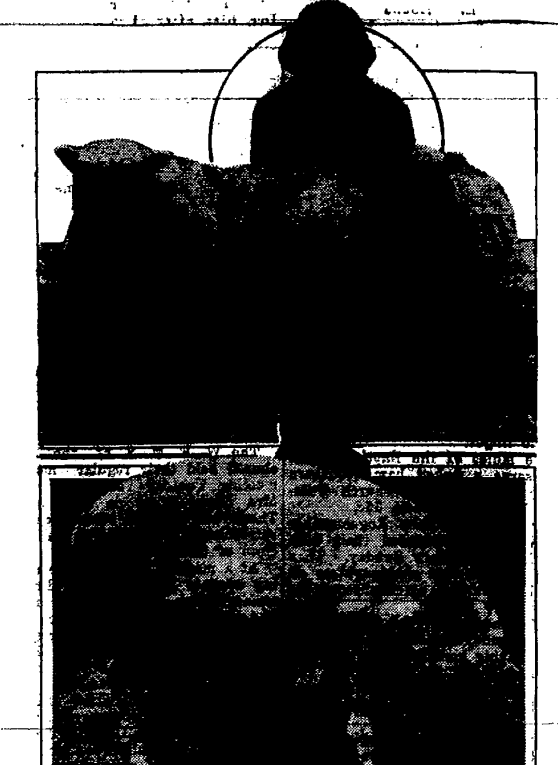

I LIKE SEEDS

The breath of the North Wind turned cold early in the hunting moon; trails thru the woods had to be broken because of the heavy snowfall.
