...Uncle Ab says that big farms may be efficient, but they are not as efficient as a "big" farmer.

Milk is the most important source of income on 62 dairy farms in the Wharton Valley section of Otsego county.

During 1933, 4-H club members in New York State raised 135,000 bushels of farm and garden crops, 12,500 head of livestock, and 127,-000 head of poultry.

Studies made of 368 farm families, in New York State, show that they spend \$326 a year for food. The studies were made in Allegany, Chautauqua, Niagara and Yates counties.

\*\*Between May 1 and December 23, Federal land banks loaned \$59,237, 526 from the \$200,000,000 appro-priated by the last Congress to re-lieve pressure of farm debts.

Total dressed weight of meat animals slaughtered under Federal inspection during September amounted to 1,065,000,000 pounds. It was three per cent larger than the total for September 1932 and the largest on record for the month.


