Bits of Allegany County News

Whitesville reports the Spring Mills improved road as not standing heavy traffic. It was built with a gravel base instead of with local stone. It will have to have attention this spring.
Alfred's Radio Club of 15 persons has just admitted its first woman member. Application has been made for a broadcasting station.
Clarksville is buying a new town truck for road work.
Black Creek church has called Rev. Mr. Baker and he has accepted. Clarksville poultrymen are disappointed with the output of hen fruit.
Cuba sent out but one-fourth of its normal milk to New York City during the milk strike of 15 years ago, in force during some of January. Dealers at that time were offering \$3.60 per hundred but the Dairymen's League hold out for \$4.10, claimed to be based on the cost of production.
Rockville's postoffice is to be discontinued after February 1st, as a measure of government economy.
Cuba circulated 18,559 volumes from its library during 1933. It has 5,962 books on its shelves.
Rockville reports a transient sleeping under a haystack in an orchard January 6th. Three asked to sleep in the barn one night, claiming they were C.C.C. boys.
Angelica has a new fire truck, smaller than the old one but fast and powerful, having a 200-gallon booster tank. It will serve town and village both, with distinguishing alarms. It is believed it will handle easily on rough or icy country roads. Funds to pay cash for it were advanced by the village's electric light board.
Bolivar's school district No. 5, California Hollow, will not pay a school tax this year, despite its annual budget of \$1,100. One teacher instructs 16 pupils. Economical management by Trustee E. D. Smith, with a good balance left over from last year, is the reason for no tax levy in 1933-34. Last year the tax was but 2 1/2 mill and the previous year but 6 1/2.
Obi's librarian reports readers numerous. Over 100 books were out last week.
Bolivar is taking down the chimneys in its unused school houses and using the bricks in ratching basin in new drainage water lines.
Allegany's oil fields completed 76 wells in 1934 of which 24 were dry.
Allegany county's court house and jail at Angelica, use of which was being discontinued in 1935, sold for but \$860 at auction. It was understood then it was to be used for a village jail and town hall.
Bolivar's central school auditorium has new stage dressing rooms with make-up tables.

Dr. Davie Opens Small Animal Hospital

Dr. L. C. Davie, veterinarian of Wellsville, has opened a small animal hospital at 50 Cummings Place and is prepared to receive small animals for surgical and medical treatment.
Dr. Davie also will board cats and dogs at very reasonable rates.
Provision has been made to keep all infectious and contagious cases entirely separated from the hospital. The new hospital has been equipped with a fine open-air runway.

W. F. O'Connell has been appointed by General Director Carl Byoir, Birthday Ball for the President as local chairman of the party in Andover. There are to be over 500 balls held on January 30th, the President's birthday, and one dollar from each admission is to be sent for an endowment fund for the Warm Springs Foundation for the cure of infantile paralysis. Would Fix Own Salaries

The Steuben County Board of Supervisors has passed a resolution asking the State Legislature to repeal the law which fixes the salaries of county sheriff, county treasurer and county clerk, leaving such salaries for regulation by the supervisors. The resolution also seeks a law authorizing the county clerk to charge one dollar for filing any note of legal issue; also is requested a law allowing the county to file lien against property of any person who accepts any form of public relief.

Growing Pure Bred Cheviot Sheep

Five Allegany county 4-H Club members now own purebred Cheviot sheep.
Isabelle Karn of Cuba has just secured a purebred Cheviot ewe from the flock of H. E. Morris of LeRoy, the animal to be added to her flock which is a part of her 4-H Club project.
