### LIBRARY SUBSCRIBES TO NEW MAGAZINES

Starting with the January issues, copies of seven leading magazines will be available in the High School Library. Renewal subscriptions have been placed with the publishers for The American Boy, The Literary Digest and Popular Science. The newly subscribed to magazines are Boys' Life, Golden Book, Popular Mechanics and The Reader's Digest.

With the advent of these new magazines, stricter rules regarding their use will be enforced. Hereafter only magazines at least a month old may be taken from the library and then they may be kept for only one night, i.e. they must be returned the day after they are taken out. Also, if the magazines are destroyed in any way while they are in the library, all magazines will be taken off the shelves and students will not be permitted to use them.

Thus a student will, by defacing the magazines, not only deprive himself but also the entire student body of the use of these magazines.

## ANDOVER WINS ITS FIRST LEAGUE GAME

Defeats Fillmore at Fillmore 26-22. May be Protested.

Andover High School defeated Fillmore 26-22 on Fillmore's floor last Friday night, to win their first league basketball game.

Andover led thruout the game, but was threatened several times. Paul Alderson and Jim Cannon did most of the purple's scoring with 12 and eight points respectively. Four men did all the scoring for Fillmore.

Jim Cannon led the purple scoring the first quarter with two field goals and a foul shot by Briggs gave the purple a 5-1 lead at the end of the quarter.

Andover increased its lead during the second quarter with Paul Alderson scoring four times from the field, while Fillmore was making six points. Andover led at half time 13-7.

During the third quarter Fillmore came within two points of equalling the Andover score and the period ended 17-15. Fillmore could not maintain the pace however, and Andover again increased the score, the game ending 26-22.

During the last quarter referee Adleman refused to permit Pease from re-entering the game, when he should have been allowed to do so. The Fillmore coach said that the game would be protested, but as yet it has not been.

## Surrogate Business Light

Letters of administration on the \$1,000 personal property estate of the late Bertha Hopkins of the town of Hump, who died January 1 were issued in Allegany County Surrogate Court last Friday to Forest W. Hopkins, Buffalo. Heirs are four sons, Forrest, Merle C. of Wheeler, Clifford M. of Rochester, Willis C. of Fillmore; three daughters, Metta Denning and Mina McDonald of Fillmore and Mernie McBride of Wheeler.

Letters testamentary were issued to Luther J. Thomas, Rushford, husband of Flora M. Thomas, and named executor in her will disposing of an estate estimated at \$5,000 personal and \$2,000 real property in value. The Free Methodist church of Rushford was willed \$1,500, to be used as its trustees deem best; and the Gerry, Chautauqua Lake, orphanage \$500. The remainder of the estate goes to Mr. Thomas. Mrs. Thomas died in Preston, Canada, December 21.

A judicial settlement of the accounts of William J. McKee, Scio, and Hazel Scott, Cuba, executors of the estate of Ida M. McKee, Bolivar was made. The estate totalled \$23,612 in value.

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## WRONG THINKING HURTS RECOVERY

Professor R. M. Stewart Says Indifference Handicaps Plans for Progress

Wrong mental attitudes handicap the recovery program, says Professor R. M. Stewart of the rural education department at the New York state college of agriculture.

He tells the story of talking with a young man from the country about various matters concerning recovery of agriculture. The young man, he found, was indifferent and almost hostile to parts of the recovery program.

Before Professor Stewart talked with him many minutes, he says, the youth was ready to see the importance of taking a more active interest in some kind of a co-operative program. This little incident led to the belief that many persons, in business, industry, or professional life, are hindering recovery by looking at it the wrong way.

There may be some basis for such attitudes, remarks Professor Stewart, but it is not the way out of our difficulty. The first step for either recovery or advance, he adds, is a will to go forward.

He urges young farmers to set an example. He says he believes they have become more adaptable to changing needs and that they understand the problems that must be solved.

In the challenge for a better agriculture, Professor Stewart counts on the Future Farmers of America to put forth their best efforts and says he is confident of their success.

## Supreme Court Next Week

Allegany county's first term of Supreme Court in 1934 has been set for Monday, January 22nd, with its own justice, Hon. Bernard B. Aekerman of Belmont, on the bench. A Grand Jury will sift criminal matters also.

The calendar lists 46 general and five equity cases. Negligence cases lead with 15, four each for assault, on contract, and for recovery; two cases each on notes and alienation of affections, one each for conversion, damage, divorce, open account, cancellation of deed, slander and ejectment; eight without title. One equity case is for separation, one on foreclosure, one on lien.

The assault case of Warren Abbey an infant vs. Lewis Smith, heads the preferred calendar, with nine actions listed on the first day calendar.

Of the 46 general cases listed all

but eight have originated since Jan. 1, 1933, and one since 1934 began. Three date back into 1930, five into 1932.
