Turning Back the Pages Of Andover History

TAKEN FROM THE FILES OF THE ANDOVER NEWS

Forty Years Ago

JANUARY 24, 1894

Water Works Tested
Thursday morning at 4:30 the fire alarm sounded for the first time since the completion of our new water works. The scene of the blaze was the O'Boyle property near the depot, occupied by John Bice as a shoe shop. The building itself was a mass of flames when the alarm sounded. The firemen, however, quickly had two powerful streams of water playing on adjacent buildings which were easily saved, and then turning their attention to the burning building put the fire out there before the walls entirely fell. It was plainly demonstrated that water would put out fire and that Andover had the water.

James Conley
James Conley died very suddenly Monday forenoon at his home opposite the Mead school house, town of Greenwood. Mr. Conley seemed in usual health in the morning and did his share of the work around the barn. After going to the house he was taken violently ill and died before a physician could get to him. The doctor pronounced the cause as heart difficulty. He was 70 years of age. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the M. E. church in Andover.

Dog Owners' Notice

Dog licenses for 1933 expired on December 31, 1933. The 1934 license fee is due January 1st. Licenses so issued will cover the period from January 1 to December 31, 1934. Every dog must wear a tag of the current dog license year. A dog without such a tag is not protected by law and no action can be maintained for his injury or destruction.

An unlicensed dog may be seized and killed and the fact that a dog is without a tag is presumptive evidence that the dog is unlicensed.

Dog licenses must be obtained from the clerk of the city or town where the dog is harbored or kept.

License fees: Male dog \$2.25; female dog \$5.75; spayed female dog, \$2.25. These amounts include clerk's fees.

No license can be issued for less than the full license year.

The owner of a dog who fails or refuses to obtain a license for the dog as required by law incurs a penalty of \$10.00 and costs.

The enumerators of towns and the police departments of cities are required to prepare in January of this year a list of dog owners. The omission of the name of an owner from the enumerator's or police list will not excuse the owner from obtaining a license.

If you owned a dog last year and do not own one now, so advise the clerk of your town or city.
