H. L. Hodnett & Sons, Fillmore potato growers, won second prize in the Rural Russets class, third in the White Russets class and fifth in the 60-pound field run exhibit at last week's Rochester show of the Empire State Potato Club.

Allegany county 4-H Club winners were: Decatur Clarke, Independence, first; Farnum Graves, Shong, second and third; Frederick Sisson, Almond, fourth; Franklin Karn, Cuba, fifth. Other 4-H members winning one bag of fertilizer each were: Ernest and Walter Schutt, Scio, and Wilfred Harms, Belmont.

It was brought out at the meeting that Allegany county, seventh on the state list for growing potatoes, had 7,385 acres in potatoes in 1933, which is 3.5 per cent of the state total. It has reduced its total 18 per cent since 1919.
