Three Divorces Granted

Three interlocutory decrees of divorce and one annulment was granted last Saturday at Belmont by Justice Bernard B. Ackerman in special session of the Supreme Court.

Lloyd F. Wright, Hornell, was complainant against Gladys D. Wright. The couple married July 10, 1928 in Hornell and separated Jan. 3, 1934. They have one child. Attorney Lyle W. Jackson, Hornell, prosecuted the case for the plaintiff.

Leona L. Ebert of Nunda was plaintiff in an action against Arthur B. Ebert who did not appear to contest. The Eberts married in Batavia, April 22, 1914, and separated Jan. 26, 1933. They have no children. Attorney Floyd E. Whiteman, Hornell, was Mrs. Ebert's attorney.

Panzy D. Ross of Hornell appeared against Michael W. Ross and was represented by Attorney Harry Morton of Hornell. The Ross' married Jan. 7, 1919, and separated Aug. 10, 1933. They have three children, the custody of the youngest being awarded to Mrs. Ross. Other children are with relatives.

An annulment was granted to Cassie Reap of Niagara Falls, complainant against Charles J. Reap. They married March 5, 1927 at Erie, Pa., but had never lived together due to the objection of the plaintiff's mother.

Supreme Court Term Continues

With but one case in the January term of Supreme Court reaching a jury in the first week, trial of others of the 19 cases reported ready on the opening day has continued.

Fred L. Scott of the town of Grove was given a verdict of \$15,000 against William McGraw of West Union, Steuben county, for alienation of his wife's affections. While the Scott family resided at Garwoods, McGraw came to the home seeking a lease for gas or oil on Scott's farm. That was in 1926. Not long after that Mrs. Scott disappeared and her husband could not locate her after diligent search. In 1927 she phoned that she would like to come home and did so but remained only a week. Scott found her in Salamanca in the home of McGraw but she would not return home with him. McGraw is said by acquaintances to have since married another Mrs. Scott. McGraw made no defense in person or by attorney.

The \$500 assault case of Warren Abbey, ten-year-old Wellsville boy, against Lewis Smith, Wellsville junk dealer, the negligence case and of the village of Wellsville against Lawrence D. Reed, same place, for negligence, were put over the term after trial had been begun in order to make changes in pleadings.

Friday was given up to hearing testimony of plaintiffs, physicians and witnesses in the three automobile negligence actions of Philip H. Cole of Ceres, his wife, Eloise, and their infant son, Philip W., against George W. Birtell of Richburg. The damage sought was \$23,750. The Coles claim their car was hit by Birtell's car Sept. 6, 1933, between Bolivar and Ceres and the baby's skull fractured and both parents injured. Birtell contends he was hurt also. The case continued into Monday. Robert E. Murrin of Olean for the defendant, Nevins & Nevins and Ernest R. Hornburg of Olean for the Coles, were attorneys.

The oriental fruit moth, once described as the greatest orchard insect mystery, is yielding to an attack of insect parasites which were released against the moth throughout western New York during the past six years.

Nine Indicted Plead Guilty

Nine of the persons, one woman and eight men, indicted for various crimes by the Grand Jury of last week, pled guilty and were sentenced in County Court by Judge Walter N. Renwick on Friday. District Attorney Ward M. Hopkins was in court as prosecuting officer.

Mrs. Hazel May Button of Harrison Valley, Pa., admitted forging a check for \$35, promised restitution, and was released on three years probation to Sheriff Edson A. Brigham. It was learned that Mrs. Button was to become a mother in

March. She has been in jail at Belmont since October 4th.

Harold White, Buffalo; Kermit Perry and Harry Davis, both of Hunts, and Walter Haines of Piffard, confessed to taking clothing at a Short Tract dance last fall. Each drew a suspended three months sentence to the Monroe county penitentiary, a \$12.50 fine and two years parole to Deputy Sheriff McCall, Nunda.

Edward Harrington, Belfast, and Eugene H. King, Nile, admitted unlawful entry. Harrington must pay a fine of \$100 or serve it out at Belmont at the rate of \$2 per day. King had served three and one-half months and was released.

Harold A. McKee, once an Allegany county resident, now of Charleston, W. Va., drew the most severe sentence of the day. He must spend from one to two years in Attica state prison for forgery, issuing a \$20 check. Archie O. White of Inavale, a blacksmith, in jail four months, confessed to making a \$5 forged check while intoxicated, his first law violation. A one to two years sentence to Attica prison was suspended, parole of three years to Sheriff Brigham ordered.

Two pleas of not guilty were entered by Don H. McKelvey, Cuba, and Virgil Murray, Olean, indicted for grand larceny in the theft of two automobiles and some tires, etc. McKelvey is rated as a second offender and Murray as a third offender under the Baumes law. They were the only prisoners to appear in court. Attorney Eldyn V. Champlin, Belmont, was named to defend them and they were remanded to jail.
