More Autos Are Registered

If increased registration of passenger automobiles in Allegany county is any sign of returning prosperity, Old Man Depression is well on the run.

Figures from the automobile bureau of County Clerk Dr. William W. Bush show that 5,765 passenger cars had been licensed up to the close of business on January 31st, 1934, as against 5,275 on December 31, 1933, a gain of 490. This looks as the 1,000 or more persons were to enjoy the delights and business facilities of motoring this year than last.

LIGHTING FOR COMFORT

Kitchen light is most important to the comfort of the homemaker who must spend hours there daily. Good lighting does away with continual glare on the eyes, it prevents groping in the dark, and avoids the necessity of working in shadows that bad lighting brings. Any one of these tries the nerves and tires the whole body.

The New York State college of home economics gives these suggestions to avoid lighting troubles:

Use sheer window curtains that admit a maximum of light.


Choose bright, sunny colors for walls and curtains; cream or pale yellow are easier on the eyes than plain white.

Place electric lights carefully; with only one light, the best position is close to the ceiling, inside a frosted globe that spreads light with very few shadows. With more lights place one each over the three working units, stove, table and sink.

Electric lights have no shades, be sure the bulbs themselves are made of frosted glass.

For painted walls, use a dull-surface paint that will not create glare.

FOOD, DRUG, COSMETICS AND ALLIED INDUSTRIES

Chase is congested as resulting from Professor Tugwell's proposed new food and drug law to be considered at coming session of Congress.

The Tugwell Bill places in jeopardy the jobs of approximately 1,775,000 employees in the food, drug, cosmetic and allied industries, according to the New York Board of Trade.

The consumer will be the ultimate sufferer because the economic structure of the country would be shattered. Each individual would feel the stress of the increased cost of medication and the lowered standard of living.

The Sherman Bill is a prohibitory measure which forces upon its creators the responsibility of maintaining and increasing living standards under the control of a bureaucratic czar. Public sentiment expressed through members of Congress will defeat this measure.
