well under operation. The Public Works Administration and the Civil Works Administration are both pouring out millions in the hope of stimulating economic conditions. The NRA program is not yet working as smoothly as it was intended. Further adjustments and revised codes must be affected.

The outcome of these efforts cannot yet be deter-Neither can the best course of procedure beyoud the present program be determined at present. Yet, there are those who would force thru further experiments and new departures thru congressional enact. ments before the present program has had time to be a thoroly tested and results determined.

Notable among the new ideas that various proponents would force thru congress are Federal Old Age labour payable in advance. Pension, Federal Unemployment Insurance, stock mar ket regulations, 30-hour week, remonetization of silver) and other like ideas. It is apparent that none of these fit in with the government's relief measures. In fact, many of them conflict and would defeat the purpose of projects and plans now functioning.

Early adjournment of congress, before these new! ideas of legislation can be forced upon it, is the solution to speeded economic recovery. A continued sion of congress always causes unrest and business, uncertainty. A Helping Hand for Cuba

THE United States has officially recognized the re-Mendieta government of Cube which will tend to stabilize conditions on the island. And recognition by the United States was followed by several other coun tries which will also hear force in the right direction This country had withheld recognition since the overthrow of the Machada government some six mouth

However, the administration at Washington went a step further in lending a helping hand to Cuba than just official recognition. It has agreed to admit some 2,000,000 pounds of sugar from that country to be traded on the American markets, and to lower tariffon other products from Cuba.

This should prove a real help to Cuba since the disturbances which have been prevalent in Cuba have been due, in great measure, to poor economic conditions. Admission of the large amount of sugar which is one of the chief exports of the island, and a major industry, and the lowering of tariffs on other products, should materially increase business in Cuba and hel restore economic conditions to normal.






