Distributing Surplus Cereal and Eggs

Distribution of surplus foods, purchased by the federal government to aid the agricultural situation, continues in Allegany county, with added supplies now available.
Milk Wheat, a cereal in two-pound packages, of which 4,528 pounds is available in this county, is now being given out on orders from town welfare officers. A supply of 1,290 dozen eggs has also been made available. These foods are being distributed thru the nine Market Basket stores within the county.
During January, 808 pounds of butter were distributed to 395 families, and 697 pounds of salt pork to 96 families.
The giving out of these supplies has not been allowed to interfere with the use of provisions purchased on orders given out cannot be decreased because of their distribution. They are extra food to the families to whom given.
