The public schools are a co-operative enterprise, and to obtain the best results, we should all be thinking and working on plans for their improvement. It might seem presumptious for one who has not been in a school room since he graduated, to offer a criticism of a school teacher or executive, or methods which are being used, but since school authorities always invite an expression of sentiment regarding the conduct of the schools, patrons may feel free to say what they wish if they are well informed regarding

the matter in question. In offering criticism, school patrons should not do so in the spirit of finding fault, because such methods!" will not build up, but will tear down the morale. Criticism given only with the best interests of the schools in mind will be of some value. And it should be be offered only after careful thought and not on the spur of the moment, for the majority of such criticism unfounded and unfair.




