The New Home

The new home of the state college of home economics is believed to be the most modern and best

to be the most modern and best equipped building of its kind in the country

It is 349 feet long. 167 feet wide, four stories high in front, six in the rear, and seven in the center.

By grouping the offices together instead of placing them separately a near the laboratories, an extra floor has been gained in the center.

The architectural type of the building is Georgian; buff brick is general, consists of a long center section connecting two large wings. The center section is a solid block to offices of the 60 members of the resident and extension staff and a few conference and class rooms. Most of the lecture rooms and laboratories as well as the auditorium, are in the wings.

In the building are 560 rooms, 70 offices, 26 laboratories, five lecture rooms, including amphitheater, 15 reading and work rooms and the seminar and conference rooms.

The main auditorium seats 600 mand the cafeteria 280. The whole building is so arranged that the departments most closely related are grouped together. Thus, laboratories of the department of foods, nutrition, and chemistry are in the sum wing as the cafeteria. Progress of Past Year Outlined by Professor G. F. Warren at Cornell.

"Much of the long road to recovery still lies ahead." Professor G. F. Warren, head of the depart-ment of agricultural economics at Cornell told a large crowd of farm and home week visitors in Bailey

G. F. Warren, head of the department of agricultural economics at Cornell told a large crowd of farm and home week visitors in Bailey auditorium.

"It is impossible to realize," he said, "how serious conditions were in the United States in February, 1933. Our problem was not merely a breakdown in the credit structure, but social unrest was growing, and was becoming a serious menace. The trace of recovery, however, since that time has been very rapid."

The speaker cited the return of courage as one of the striking improvements. "However bad the present," he pointed out, "we are beginning to believe that the future holds once more the promise of better times. Periods of doubt may return, because recovery is checked or is too slow: but whatever that

return, because recovery is checked or is too slow; but whatever the outlook for a given month, I think we have solid ground for expecting each year to show a distinct im-provement."

Prices paid to farmers, Dr. Warren said, fell to less than a third of prices before the depression and less than half the price level before the war; and he added that prices paid to farmers from February, 1938 to January this year rose 45 per cent. "This still leaves farmers less than half of the price level before the depression and far below pre-war prices. The better feeling on farms is quite as much due to hope for a future rise in prices as to the rise that has already occurred.
