### Use Inexpensive Cuts Of Meat To Help Out The Economy Budget

Percentage of Edible Meat Is Greater in Economy Cuts Per Dollar Spent Than in Fancy Meats

By CHARLES H. BALDWIN Commissioner, Department of Agriculture and Markets

IT is an important thing to the 4 New York State food consumer in these days of budget balancing necessity to know that the less expensive cuts of meat cost less per pound of lean, edible meat, than the so-called "fancy" cuts. The cheaper cuts constitute 74 per cent of the carcass of beef. By moist heat cooking, such as braising, stewing and cooking with water-never boiling-they can be made just as delicious, highly flavored and appetizing and nutritious as the cuts from the choicer 24 per


