Linoleum is a good substitute for oil cloth on the kitchen table and the finish on other kitchen work surfaces, says the New York State college of home economics. Linoleum is waterproof, washable, and colorful, just like oilcloth; and because it is slightly springy, it lessens the chance of breakage for dishes, and it will last for almost a lifetime.



and the linoleum is laid in place over the cement, with its edge close to the back wall. The cement closes up any cracks.

Waterproof cement is used instead of ordinary linoleum cement because it contains rubber and prevents water from seeping thru the cracks and rotting the back of the linoleum. Then the linoleum is weighted down with bricks to keep it perfectly flat until the cement is day.

A coat of spar vamish over the linoleum makes it possible to set hot utensils on the surface without harm. If the linoleum has a wax finish, however, varnish will not stick to it, and it should be waxed occasionally instead. The edges of the linoleum
