(Special to Andover News) Alfred, Mar. 12.—The Registrar of Alfred University has just announced a group of 104 honor students out of 539 regularly registered students last semester.

Students whose indexes for the first semester ranged between 2.00, and 3.00 the perfect index, are those who achieved a place on the honor roll.

Among the classes the honor students were: 24 out of 84 seniors, 19 out of 39 juniors, 22 out of 173 sophomores, and 34 out of 185 freshmen.
