Belmont Grange has acquired by tax purchase the Courtney Smith mill property, Norton and Whitney streets, and will erect a Grange hall in the near future.  
 Allegany county, 25 years ago, received as one-half of the year's state aid for schools, \$26,800. This year the same help for rural education amounted to \$307,119. Quite some difference!  
 Alfred University Glee Club is touring Western New York high schools and singing before assemblies.

He served as conductor on the Pennsylvania railroad. A fall from the train in 1933 resulted in a spine injury, making him a cripple for life.
