Bits of Allegany County News

Belfast taxpayers will hold a public meeting at the town hall, Monday, April 2nd at 1 p. m., to determine whether they shall establish a fire district whose bounds shall be those of that town. More than one-half of the taxpayers have requested the action.

Fillmore hears that the Pennsylvania Railroad has been ordered by the Public Service Commission to proceed with the construction of the condensory underpass in that village.

Belfast High School holds a speaking contest the evening of April 11, to determine which scholar shall represent it at the county contest at Bolivar central school, April 26 and 27.

Allegany county Odd Fellow lodges to the number of eight have pledged themselves to scheduled visitations to other lodges. The villages having lodges thus interested are: Andover, Belmont, Angelica, Cuba, Fillmore, Wellsville and Whitesville, and Friendship.

Allegany county school directors of the fifth supervisory district have re-elected Bayard Fuller of Wellsville as chairman; Mrs. Jeannette Cornell of Whitesville, clerk.

Friendship village trustees find unpaid taxes approximately \$900, a usual average. No increased tax rate is anticipated despite increased outlays because of CWA work done on streets and elsewhere.

Bolivar's unused high school building, built in 1905 but abandoned in 1930, is being torn down as a CWA project and brick and lumber salvaged. A village park, 125x200 feet in size, with bandstand, will take its place.

Wirt and Bolivar towns see prospects of extensive drilling. The Messer Oil company will five-spot the Griffin farm, Richburg. South Penn Oil company will sink 54 wells in Black and George Hollow where it has 300 acres. Six machines have been moved in and Bradford drillers will do the work, living in a camp on the Harwood farm.

Allegany county had 54 lawyers in 1895, says the Bolivar Breeze. Supreme court calendar for the Jan. 22, 1934 term listed but 34.

Allegany county may lose ten rural mail carriers if economy plans of Postmaster General Farley carry thru. Or he may cut salaries. He has declared he can save \$11,000, 000 annually by lopping off one route in four.

Whitesville's board of education, on petition of 70 patrons of the school, has rescinded its action to dispense with music and drawing teaching.

Fillmore's senior class cleaned up \$150 with its annual play. Its double quartet of boys has been engaged to broadcast later over a buffalo station.
