Lou L. Burton, county club agent, advises members to get their sheep shorn in the near future if not yet attended to and to start lambs on grain if to be shown at the county fair in August. All fat lambs shown at Angelica are eligible to be shown and sold at the State Fair. There will be a class for shorn fleeces at the county fair.
