Six of Seven go Free

A father sat by in special term of county court Friday and heard Judge Walter N. Renwick send his oldest son to Elmira Reformatory after a plea of guilty to second degree forgery. When asked what he thought before sentence was pronounced he felt further leniency useless. The son was Herbert L. Kemp, 21 years old, of Pikeville, who admitted cashing his father's \$80 pay check. His brother, Jay B., 18 years old, who confessed complicity, was given a suspended sentence to Elmira and must report to Sheriff Edson A. Brigham.

Raymond Ritter, 23 years old, a farmer, of Whitesville, confessed to forging two checks totalling \$14, promised restitution and was given a suspended sentence to Elmira reformatory, paroled to Sheriff Brigham.

Mrs. Lydia M. Stuck of Whitesville, living in Belfast with some of her family, admitted a serious statutory charge following her arrest on a sealed indictment the day previous. Imposition of sentence was deferred.

Three youths from Olean and Allegany, confessed to entering Cuba Lak cottages and asked leniency, one was an Eagle Scout, another a Scout. Judge Renwick spoke of how infrequently he had youths before him who had Scout training and urged the boys to never again forget their Scout oath. He deferred imposition of any sentence but District Attorney Ward M. Hopkins reminded the three that another indictment was hanging over them that would be pressed unless they carried themselves carefully. They were paroled to James McCready, Olean truant officer.

None of these arraigned had previous criminal records, said Mr. Stuck.

Alfred University's entertainment of the 26th annual interscholastic field and track meet May 3 and 4 promises to be an outstanding success. Entry blanks have been requested from 26 nearby high schools for more than 400 athletes and 20 speakers.

Whatever the reason, Allegany county towns will receive less than one-half the share of state beer taxes disbursed three months ago by County Treasurer Claude L. Cummings. The tax funds distributed April 27th was for the first three months of 1934 and totalled but \$3,454.50. Alfred's Peace Action Group has circulated petitions urging the federal government to state the terms under which it would join the League of Nations, and secured 124 signatures from the 136 voters to whom it had been presented. A peace movement petition will be circulated later.

Hallsport reports a remarkable school attendance record with 21 pupils thus far this year present every day.

Belmont entertains the annual institute of the Allegany County Womens Christian Temperance Union on Friday. Mrs. Clara A. Jacob of Rochester, state secretary of the Young People's Branch, will be the evening speaker, with other state workers expected.

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Supreme Court Term Ends

The April term of Supreme Court for Allegany county ended Thursday afternoon when a jury brought in a verdict of \$990.72 for Mrs. Minnie Seavert of Caneadea in her recovery action against the Farmers and Traders Life Insurance Company of Syracuse. The question raised was whether her husband, Edward F. Seavert, who died from cerebral hemorrhage June 25, 1933 after being given a policy June 9, following a medical examination on April 21, has misrepresented his health by stating in his application that he was suffering from no known disease where he had been to consult a physician January 27. Testimony was given by four county physicians, some of it quite technical

over high blood pressure and hardening of the arteries, and by neighbors who saw him daily before his very sudden death. He was passed by the company's medical examiner, Dr. J. H. Lyman, Fillmore.

Mrs. Celia S. Greene, Bolivar, was unable to establish negligence by the Olean store of Montgomery, Ward & Co., after a fall on stairs there in which she hurt hips and limbs. Judge James E. Norton of Warsaw, granted a motion for a non-suit.
