



WHAT and WHY?

Sludge as a Fertilizer F. W. G., Akron, writes: "Kindly Professor E. Van Alstine replies: 'VanSlvke in his book on fertilizers and crop production reports that sewage sludge may contain as much as five per cent. nitrogen and three per cent. phosphoric acid. On this basis it compares somewhat with

dried blood, but does not contain as much plant nourishment. "One hundred pounds of sewage sludge mixed with 100 pounds of superphosphate would make a fertilizer suitable for use on most crops. Use from 500 to 2,000 pounds to the acre. The amount to use depends on the kind of crop and condition of the soil."

Trouble With Walnuts F. P. P., Fulton, says: "Last fall, I gathered more than one-half bushel of English walnuts from a tree planted 12 years ago. My only trouble was in getting the outside shucks off and leaving the nut clean. How can this be handled? Many of the walnuts drop from the shuck, while others are kept firmly inside and become discolored as the shucks soften. How can this be avoided? "I would appreciate a chart for spraying cherry and apple trees." Professor L. H. MacDaniels the pomology department answer: "Bacterial infection, resulting from a disease known as bacteriosis, may prevent English walnuts from coming out of their shucks. This is usually apparent during the winter. The diseased nuts show black spots which disfigure the husks, and sometimes cause the nuts to fall off ir

(advance. In California, this disease is controlled by spraying with 13-3-50 Bordeaux mixture about the time the trees blossom. "Sticking of the husks is also caused by wet weather in the fall. or by a lack of maturity in the nuts before the foliage is frozen off. The definite cause of your trouble can not be stated without further information. If you have seen black spots on the young nuts that indicate bacterial disease, I suggest you write! to Dr. D. S. Welch of the plant pathology department at Cornell for




