Bits of Allegany County News

Belmont is watching erection of steel on the Genesee street bridge over the Genesee river on the Alfred road, expected to take 30 days. Friendship's recently organized central school band of 44 pieces, gives its first public concert Friday evening.
Transit's new highway bridge over the Genesee is expected to be opened to traffic June 1st. It was built with Federal aid.
Friendship lost one of its barbers a few days ago. He returned to his trade as a machinist.

Belmont has arranged for a Mother and Daughter Banquet, May 25, when Mrs. Joseph Henderson of Olean will speak on "The Ideal Woman." The village has a new undertaker, R. J. Sullivan.
Cuba has set July 20, 21 and 22 for its third annual Old Home Week celebration and committees are already at work for the event. Attorney Harry E. Keller is chairman of the executive committee.
Scio Genesee Valley Grange has formed a Juvenile Grange for the youthful sons and daughters of its members.

Cuba Baptists highly honored Mrs. Charles A. Gallup on her retirement as superintendent of the elementary department of their Sunday School. Mrs. Gallup has been singularly successful in her work and has become known as an authority in that line of endeavor.
Wisico Creek farms will be leased for fishing rights by the State and the stream kept open to retain its reputation as a trout creek par excellence if Wyoming and Livingston county fishermen have their way. The move is being made before private owners secure control of it as they have most other public fishing grounds over the state.
Fillmore's Chamber of Commerce plans to entertain the wives and women friends of members, June 12 the last meeting before the summer recess.

Angelica has had an epidemic of pneumonia among children. At least six were ill at one time.
Fillmore firemen have signed a contract for \$200 worth of fireworks for the Fourth of July celebration, an annual event there.
Richburg is attending a series of evangelistic meetings under direction of Dr. George W. Cooke, well known speaker, meetings in the Baptist church.
Allegany county residents are finding that the severe freezes of last winter have killed many rose bushes and shrubs. Scrub apple trees which bear only gnarly, wormy fruit, seem to have escaped, however, and are blossoming full.

Bolivar fishermen have secured 30 cans of bullheads from the Bemus Point hatchery, conducted by the state, and have planted them in streams in that vicinity. Some of the fish were as much as 15 inches long, all in fine condition.
Bolivar's excise board in 1895 granted seven liquor licenses there, costing but \$30 each. Wellsville was "dry," all applicants being refused the right to sell. On May 5, the thermometer stood at 86 in the shade, breaking all previous records.
Bolivar Central School has lost its valued science instructor, George H. Kyser, who has taken up research work with a commercial enterprise. He has been succeeded by C. F. Schaum of Hornell.

Whitesville firemen are circulating petitions to put up to taxpayers next fall the purchase of adequate fire-fighting apparatus for protection of village and town.
Alfred's Mutual Loan Association will celebrate 50 years of helpful life on May 23 at the parish house at a banquet.
