have been highly disappointing. The persecution of the Jews was among the first unsettling factors. Exvorable results followed. The default of foreign debts of Chancellor Hitler's procedure concerning foreign policies and politics affecting the standing of Germany toward foreign nations bred distrust and the consequent efforts to curb his popularity. Suppression the freedom of the press in Germany alone did great damage to the prestige that Hitler might have enjoyed and the power he might have wielded.

Now, the execution of those who have dared to criticize or defy him has brought on a situation that i among the brown shirts, was among those who lost undisputed power. It is not likely that German peo ple will submit to the tactics of Red Russia in the wholesale murder of those who dare to oppose political program of the country.

The unsound leadership of Hitler seems to be tottering. What will follow is difficult to predict. Only time can be the determining factor as to whether or not Germany will be driven to extreme radicalism such as is to be found in Russia or whether a sound government will arise from the ruins of the swashbuckling Hitler regime. It is almost certain that something will happen, for the present trouble has only begun.
