Tragedy Near Whitesville

Whitesville was shocked at the finding of two dead bodies, that of Mrs. Viola Gardner Blackman, 27 years old, and Elmer H. Cowburn, 42, formerly of Ulysses, in the woods on the Frank Stebbins farm on the bank of Cryder Creek, Tuesday.

Mrs. Blackman and three children had been living with Cowburn since her estrangement from her husband, Harold Blackman of Newfield, Pa., last March. The couple came to Whitesville and had been living with her brother, Devillo Gardner in an old school house near Whitesville. The two were last seen entering the woods with a rifle, claiming they were hunting woodchucks.

The woman was hanging from the limb of a tree, a piece of wire forming the noose cutting deep into her neck. At her feet the body of the man lay stretched on the ground, shot thru the left eye, the gun between his legs. In his pocket a note "I have done this cause I wanted up. Now don't enny folks take on cause I don't want you to. E. H. Cowburn."

The authorities are in doubt as to whether it was a murder and a suicide or a double suicide. Three children of Viola and Harold Blackman are being cared for by neighbors. They are Ella, eight; Russall five years old and Richard, 18 months old.
