County Outlays Continue High

Outlays of funde by County reasurer Claude R. Cummings con-Treasurer Claude R. Cummings continue to run into large figures, as shown by the usual monthly report of expenditures for July, given to the press. The total paid out was \$138,047.38, of which \$111,187.21 was from purely county funds. The balance was disbursement to towns of state funds or to workers on civil works projects.

The two largest items of the month from county funds were for returned school taxes to districts and for county road projects. Work on the latter is at its peak at this season of the year.
