Recipe for the Week

Swiss Steak—10 servings—Thick round steak, 2 pounds; flour 1/2 cup, salt 1 1/2 teaspoons, pepper, 1/2 teaspoon, onion chopped; 2 tablespoons fat 1/4 cup; water hot, 1 cup; tomato juice 1 cup. Wipe meat, place on meat board and beat flour into the meat with edge of a saucer, continuing until the meat will hold no more flour. Sear meat well in Mirro Cooker in which there is one-fourth cup hot fat. The onion may be browned before meat with fat or added the last half hour of cooking. Add one-half cup hot water.
