Recipe for the Week

Chocolate Bread Pudding

Two cups milk, 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 1/2 to 2-3 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 cup bread crumbs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 square (1 oz.) chocolate or 3 tablespoons cocoa.

Beat egg yolks with butter and sugar; add crumbs, salt and milk. Cook in double boiler until thick. Beat about one minute with Dover Egg Beater; fold in vanilla and egg whites beaten stiff.
